

Sermon 2 - 2 Samuel 6 "The King and his ark"

Introduction

- i. CS Lewis said: "Christianity, if false, is of no importance; and if true, of infinite importance. The only thing it cannot be, is moderately important." Why do you think many Australians who say they believe in God, only live as if Christianity was moderately important?
- ii. Perhaps more significantly, why is it that many who attend church are living as if their relationship with God was only moderately important?

1. What's with Uzzah being struck down? - read vv1-11

- a. Why was the ark so significant for Israel and David. Why did he want it in the city?
- b. Why was Uzzah struck dead? How did you feel about that? (See Deuteronomy 29:29)
- c. What does this sudden death say to us about God?
- d. How would you answer someone who said to you "hey that's simply not fair"?
- e. What was David's response (see v9)? What would you have done?

2. What's so good about the ark? - read vv12-23

- a. What had changed David's mind about bringing up the ark to Jerusalem?
- b. What are the clues from the text that David and his people weren't going to make the same mistake re the ark again?
- c. Why is David dancing like this and wearing only a linen ephod? What are David's actions demonstrating about his view of God and of the ark?
- d. What is Michal's problem?
- e. We don't have the ark, but God is present with us even as 2 or 3 gather in his name. Why do we typically underplay the significance of meeting with God as we meet with each other?
- f. Do you usually turn up to church or connect group or other meeting with Christians with a sense of joyful anticipation?

3. The victory of the Kingdom - read vv17-25

- a. Reverence and joy: two things Mark often prays for before church. Do we have the balance right?
- b. The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. What does 'fear of the Lord' look like in someone's life? What difference does it make?
- c. At the cross, we see reasons to both tremble and rejoice: tremble at God's justice and rejoice in his grace. Does this make sense to you?

What will be your personal take home for you from this passage or study?

Pray for one another that we will have a right fear of the Lord, but also an appropriate joy!

Pray that we will never live as if our Lord God was only moderately important!

Title: The King and the ark

INTRODUCTION

• I just love this quote from CS Lewis I used at the end of a funeral sermon on Friday – and I know I've shared it with you before...

- CS Lewis said: "Christianity, if false, is of no importance, ... and if true, of infinite importance.
 The only thing it cannot be // is moderately important."
- And yet many people today live as if it is only **moderately** important... //
- All around us on the Sunshine Coast around 60% if the research is anything to go by will say
 they believe in God...
- But actually engage with him allow him to make a difference in your life a difference in who you are actually revere and reverence him... actively seek to serve him and honour him and please him take him seriously // that's another thing...!
- Even this week, I spoke to people who say they are Christians... and love God... etc... but church
 is just never on the agenda... and the morals seen in their lives show they have little or no
 understanding of the distinctive life to which Christians are called... /
- And then there are those in the church today who ARE they every Sunday.... But God can only
 be moderately important because they see God has a pushover... and twist his word to suit
 their agenda... they love the community... they love the music... they love the ritual...
- "Christianity, if false, is of no importance, ... and if true, of infinite importance. The only thing it cannot be // is moderately important." //
- In our 2 Samuel 6 this morning we'll see the absolute foolishness of living as if God were only moderately important...
- ...and we'll see the sheer magnificent joy which results when he is of infinite importance.... //
- But I don't know about you the passage raised some questions for me...
- What's with this ark anyway...?
- Why would God strike a guy dead because he was trying to ensure the ark didn't fall off the cart... how is that reasonable?
- And what's with David's extreme dancing because the ark was finally coming into the city of David...?
- And what's with David's wife sulking about David's dancing.....I mean my dancing is pretty
 embarrassing for Susan I'm sure... but is that what it was about?? //
- So this morning from 2 Samuel 6, I want us to see:
- Not the good, the bad and the ugly...
- But (in this order) the bad, the good and the take home... // So:
 - 1. What's with Uzzah being struck dead?
 - 2. What's so good about the ark?
 - 3. What's the take home?

- A quick reminder of what we saw last week... ch 5:
 - David had finally been recognised as King over **all** Israel... and we saw that **David** as King pointed us to **Jesus** God's **ultimate King** and that we are his **body** he is our **Saviour** and **Shepherd**
- We saw that Jerusalem as the City of God the city of David points us forward to that great city
 the New Jerusalem where all our hope lies where all God's promises will finally be fulfilled
- And we saw that David's victory over the Philistines, points us forward to Jesus' victory over evil
 and the evil one at the cross... and that that victory will one day be seen in all its glory and
 known in all its fullness when every knee will bow and tongue confess that Jesus is Lord. //
- Now David has his city... but the ark of the Lord is not present in the city as it had been present
 with the nation of Israel through all their wilderness wanderings.
- You remember from last year what we saw about the ark don't you??
- we don't mean **Noah's ark of course** we mean that **rectangular box** measuring 1200mm by 760mm by 760mm an **extremely significant symbol** for **Israel**...
- ... covered completely with gold
- ... was to be carried on **poles** inserted in **rings** at the **four corners**.
- Within the box were two stone tablets on which were carved the ten commandments
- And consequently it was the symbol of **God's presence** with his **people**...
- do you remember what happened in 1 Samuel?
- the ark was captured by the Philistines... they thought it had magic powers...
- But it turned out to be a disaster for the Philistines the statute of their god Dagon kept falling
 over in their temple and the Philistines themselves came out in all these tumours terrible
 things!!
- So the Philistines wanted to get rid of the ark and send it back to Israel.
- So they sent it back to Israel... but 70 Israelites took the cover off the ark and looked inside // and they died right there and then...!
- And we saw last year from that incident, that God is not to be fooled with! //
- $\bullet \qquad \dots \text{and soberingly, we're reminded of the same this morning} \dots \text{so let's ask together:} \\$

1. WHAT'S WITH UZZAH BEING STRUCK DEAD?

- Bringing the ark up to Jerusalem was a big deal... look with me at v1 David again brought together
 all the able young men of Israel thirty thousand.
- When it says 'again'.. the last time they had been gathered in such great numbers was back in last week's chapter when they'd come to proclaim David King.
- You don't get 30,000 people together every day!
- v2 He and all his men went to Baalah in Judah to bring up from there the ark of God, which is called by the Name, the name of the Lord Almighty, who is enthroned between the cherubim on the ark. 3 They set the ark of God on a new cart... STOP
- They set it on a new cart?? Alarm bells right there...!
- Do you know why?
- It was meant to be carried **hung** by **poles**... not set on a cart... mmmm... so the astute will already be wondering oh **that's not good how will this turn out?**

- Vv5, 6 have a look David and all Israel were celebrating with all their might before the Lord, with
 castanets, harps, lyres, timbrels, sistrums and cymbals. 6 When they came to the threshing floor of Nakon,
 Uzzah reached out and took hold of the ark of God, because the oxen stumbled.
- Great joy celebrations jubilation the presence of God or the symbol of his presence coming into the city of God...
- But the joy that day came to a sudden **stop**.
- The **music** stopped
- The dancing stopped
- The **cheering** stopped
- Suddenly, everything went quiet.
- v7 God struck Uzzah down, and he died there beside the ark of God.
- A friend I used to work with had been looking forward to her wedding day for ages....
- I wasn't there, but I understand it was a lovely day... great ceremony... and at the reception there
 was loads of dancing...
- Suddenly the music and the dancing stopped. Linda's father had dropped dead on the dance floor. //
- Nothing stops a party like someone dropping **dead**. /
- Why did this happen to this man?
- Because he touched the ark... /
- You're not supposed to touch the ark
- But hang on Mark, you might say he was only trying to stop it from falling off the cart!
- ...that's not fair... that's unreasonable...! would God have preferred for the ark to fall off the cart and be smashed!!??
- I don't know ///
- God had clearly warned his people that the ark must not be touched (Numbers 4:15, 20) //
- We can continue to object if we like: but the application of the text is clear you dare not trifle
 with a God who is both real and holy.
- God is not our **neat**, **warm**, **fuzzy friend** in the **sky**.
- We forget the nature of our God who loves us and is gracious towards us. But we should never take him lightly!
- But!!! / But hang on // this is just so unfair...!!
- But friends //our questions are not answered; our objections are not satisfied.
- and of course // God is not answerable to us.
- He is not obliged to win our approval. /
- Do you believe this? // Are you **OK** with **that**? //
- When the 70 men died because they looked into the ark... the men of Beth-Shemesh had asked (1 Sam 6:20) 'who is able to stand before the Lord, this holy God?'
- Here, in this instance David virtually asks the same question v9 have a look David was afraid of the Lord that day and said, "How can the ark of the Lord ever come to me?
- The question expresses the **opposite** of **presumption**. David has learned that the Lord God is not under **our control**. He is the **holy God**. He is not **tame**. He really is **terrifying**.

- Take God lightly... take what he requires lightly treat his holiness as if it were nothing and
 you end up in trouble! //
- So David abandons plans to bring the ark into the city. Doesn't want to go near it, and doesn't want it near!
- But that's not the last word about the ark in this chapter...
- And that brings us to:

2. WHAT'S SO GOOD ABOUT THE ARK?

- Have a look with me at v12 Now King David was told, "The Lord has blessed the household of Obed-Edom and everything he has, because of the ark of God." So David went to bring up the ark of God from the house of Obed-Edom to the City of David with rejoicing.
- Obed-Edom had experience great blessing because the ark of God had been with him three
 months...
- So David thought he'd try again to bring the ark up to Jerusalem... looks like everything's settled down... why should the Philistines enjoy all the blessing of the ark
- But what do you notice in v13? how is the ark being moved **this** time??
- Not on a cart they are carrying it... and as some sort of insurance policy what else are they
 doing? Sacrificing a bull and a young calf every six steps... must have been a slow trip!
- David meanwhile notice what he's wearing a linen ephod... v14 I don't have a photo for you
 (!) in fact is a little confusion as to what this garment was... it seems to have been worn by the
 priests of the time... but more than likely over other garments.
- The text seems to describe David as wearing **only** the linen garment...!? and perhaps Michal's disgust in v16 seems to suggest that it **wasn't a good look** –in her eyes he was **humiliating** himself...
- But perhaps we see not so much David <u>humiliating</u> himself but <u>humbling</u> himself!!
- - he's dancing with all his might...! *Leaping and dancing before the Lord!*
- So what's so good about the ark?- that David again wants it in the city and that its coming sparks such an amazing celebration...?
- It's the presence of God in the midst of God's people...!
- A reminder of God's promises... and faithfulness... his rescue from Egypt and of his revealed will for his people...
- We see David's humility not just in his unusual dance and costume but in bringing the ark
 into the city he's saying I'm not in charge God is in charge....
- Not my will but your will be done...!
- Not **my** kingdom your **kingdom**!! ///
- God, in the **midst** of his **people**...
- Ruling, reigning, loving, protecting... inspiring... empowering.
- No wonder David danced!!
- Remind you of anything?
- Brothers and sisters God is as present with us by his Holy Spirit as he was present with Israel
 by His Holy Ark!!!
- I'm not sure we realise the **joy** of being in God's presence... ///
- ...here we are meeting with him this morning as we meet with one another...

- God in the midst of his people...
- God who loves us so much he has given us son for us... so that we might be forgiven and redeemed!!
- God present ruling, reigning, revealing, loving, protecting... inspiring... empowering.
- Did you anticipate coming to church this morning with joy?
- Have you participated so far this morning with joy?
- Will you go out this morning with joy having met with God?? //
- Perhaps there should be more dancing! ////
- But finally we need to ask don't we:/

3. WHAT'S THE TAKE HOME?

- And some Sundays it's easier to see than others isn't it!!
- This is all so along ago...
- We can't easily relate... and besides our objections to Uzzah's sudden death remain unanswered!! //
- But what we've is seen two amazing impacts of the presence of God in this account...
- The first, is that the **presence** of God ought rightly to cause **trembling**
- Uzzah was struck down... and we go woah!! What's happening there...? this God is frightening...
- Yes. //
- And he does not need to explain **himself** to **us**.
- We read in a number of places in the OT the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.
- Jesus himself said Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, be afraid of the One who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Matthew 10:28. That is be afraid of Him!!
- God cannot be mocked... Paul says in Galatians 6:7
- Take him lightly or consider Christianity only moderately important and at some point you'll
 come face to face with the fact that that wasn't a good idea!! //
- So we see the **holiness** of God... and **something** of what that means... //
- But also in this passage... You cannot miss the accent on joy: they bring the ark into the city of
 David 'with gladness' (v12b). And David is there, dancing and cavorting with all his gusto while
 the people are shouting and the ram's horn is blasting away. Here is a holy delirium over the
 presence of God!
- Do you see the **balance** in the truth of God's word here in this **account**?
- We are to both **tremble** before God's **holiness** and **cheer** with God's joy!
- Fearfulness and gladness are held together!
- In God's presence you should both **shudder** and **dance**! //
- Whether we can comprehend this or not, 2 Samuel 6 teaches us that a fearful sense of God's holiness does not suppress joy but <u>stimulates</u> it! //
- You know what I often pray for before a service?
- That I (or whoever leads) might do so with a right balance between reverence and joy!
- That's what we see here...

- I said in the notes this week in today's church, there are many people concerned with externals
 and procedures and mechanics and meetings and decency and order but who know nothing of
 joy before the Lord!
- These are often the same people who show great enthusiasm at the football or the gay pride march, but have nothing but 'professional detachment' over Jesus Christ!
- Exuberant praise and tears of repentance are strangers to them. //
- Trembling and joy. Before our holy God... and our loving God...
- Before his severity and his mercy
- Before his judgement and his grace... //
- Lord grant us that reverence and joy in your presence not just when we gather but at all times!
